At the Partnership for Public Service, we believe that our future and our democracy depend on the ability to solve big problems—and that we need an effective federal government to do so. As part of the executive branch, federal agencies play a role in enforcing laws and policies to achieve these ends. #### THE PEOPLE OF THE INTERIOR DEPARTMENT

Each of the roughly 52,000 career federal employees at the Department of the Interior is committed to the mission of the organization: To protect and manage the nation's natural resources and cultural heritage; provide scientific and other information about those resources; and honor the department's trust responsibilities and special commitments to American Indians, Alaska Natives, Native Hawaiians and additional populations in the U.S. territories and other islands the department serves. Veterans make up about 20% of the department.<sup>1</sup>

Agencies such as the National Park Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Bureau of Indian Affairs, which manage America's vast natural and cultural resources




Departmental offices such as the Office of the Chief Information Officer and the Office of the Solicitor, which provide department-wide managerial and operational leadership
